

Honors & Awards



Geriatrics assistant professor chosen for prestigious scholars program: A new faculty member who joined the Division of General Internal Medicine, Geriatrics & Palliative Medicine, or GGP, this August, **April Ehrlich, MD, MHS**, was chosen for the Butler-Williams Scholars Program – a weeklong symposium on aging research – at the National Institute on Aging in Bethesda, Maryland. She's the first person from the U of A to receive this honor. **Learn more**.

■ Infectious Diseases division chief **Liz Connick, MD**, received \$703,000 in in bridge funding from the NIH's National Institute of

Allergy and Infectious Diseases for a study to identify factors in secondary lymphoid tissues that lead to continuous low-level expression of HIV in people living with HIV and receiving antiretroviral therapy, or ART. Learn more.

- Billie Bixby, MD, assistant professor, Division of Pulmonary, Allergy, Critical Care & Sleep Medicine, or PACCS, and director, Interventional Pulmonology Program, is site principal investigator on an R44 grant from the NIH's National Cancer Institute to study "Development of a Molecular Assay to Diagnose Malignant Pleural Effusions," related to fluid around the lungs and lung cancer. The study is funded by a \$2 million Small Business Innovation Research award through the NIH/NCI to the Department of Pathology's Mark Nelson, PhD, through his company, Precision Epigenomics Inc., to further develop EPISEEK-MPE™, its multicancer detection assay, for analysis of pleural effusion fluid to detect cancer.
- Stefano Guerra, MD, PhD, MPH, professor, PACCS division, epidemiology director at the Asthma & Airway Disease Research Center, and the Henry E. Dahlberg Chair in Asthma Research at the college, won an NIH/NIAID R21 grant for a study on "Creatine Kinase in the Natural History of Asthma." Valued at \$402,109 for its first two years, the grant allows his research team to build on work from a recent publication in the Journal of Allergy and Clinical Immunology.
- Congratulations to **Joy Bulger Beck, MD, FACP**, who was recognized in July by the Arizona Chapter of the American College of Physicians as a new fellow of the college and earning the FACP designation. Dr. Beck is a GGP division assistant professor and director of the college's Transition to Residency Bootcamp.
- In the Division of Hematology & Oncology, **Akshay Amaraneni**, **MD**, was named program director and **Alejandro Recio Boiles**, **MD**, was named associate program director of the Hematology & Medical Oncology Fellowship as of Aug. 1. Both are Hem-Onc assistant professors.
- Kudos to DOM participants at the College of Medicine Tucson's White Coat Ceremony on July 26 in Centennial Hall for the incoming Class of 2028 medical students. See a group photo of them all at the top of this newsletter. Faculty members present included: Joy Bulger Beck,



- ABRC annual grant proposal submission cycle now open: Letters of intent (LOI) for investigators who are either new (< 10 years post-doc experience @ \$75K/year X 3 years) or established (\$225K/year X 3 years) are due Sept. 19, with proposal submissions, by invitation after LOI review, to follow. There are two Arizona Biomedical Research Centre pre-submission web conferences to address questions as well. These awards have been extremely helpful in launching and extending DOM faculty research projects. See this link for more information.

Monthly publication highlight: An article by Joshua N. Farr, PhD, appearing in the July edition of Nature Medicine, is our highlighted DOM publication of the month. Dr. Farr, who recently joined our faculty from the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN, is an associate professor in the Division of Rheumatology and also holds the Ethel McChesney Bilby Endowed Chair in Osteoporosis at the U of A Arthritis Center. The publication, "Effects of intermittent senolytic therapy on bone metabolism in postmenopausal women: A phase 2 randomized controlled trial," details results of the first randomized controlled trial of intermittent senolytic treatment to mitigate adverse effects of healthy aging in women, using bone metabolism as a marker for biological efficacy. "Drugs that selectively kill senescent (or aging) cells, termed senolytics, may benefit otherwise healthy older women but are not a 'one-size-fits-all' remedy" was the

paper's key message, Dr. Farr said, adding that the results set the stage for further studies with a larger range of individuals.

Education



- DOM Vice Chair for Education **Amy Sussman, MD**, reports that fellowship recruitment is in full swing. All interviews are recommended to be virtual by the AAMC and AAIM. The match for most fellowships will be released Dec. 4. In other education news:
 - The Internal Medicine Residency Program will host a <u>Meet-and-Greet Event</u> on Sept. 11, 5-7 p.m., in the COM-T Social Hall, that will include educational leadership from the DOM and medical students (MS1-4) who are interested in IM.
 - A reminder to faculty mentoring trainees (residents/fellows) to <u>submit</u> <u>research abstracts</u> for Bressler-Alpert travel awards to present their work at upcoming conferences.
 - About 25% of the college's student body is applying to IM this season which continues to remain above the national mean.

Kent Kwoh, MD, MACR, Rheumatology division chief and U of A Arthritis Center director, kicks off the podcast offered on multiple platforms on the topic of "Joint Pain Explained." Also in this news item are the Living Healthy With Arthritis fall calendar, including lectures by GGP's Julie Jernberg, MD, and Rheumatology's Joshua Farr, PhD, and the Bear Down Celebration, Oct. 10.

<u>Valley fever</u>" (Aug. 14): Shortly after the award of \$33 million in National Institutes of Health contracts to develop a human vaccine for the debilitating if not deadly respiratory illness, the Valley Fever Center team – including **John Galgiani**, **MD**, and **Fariba Donovan**, **MD**, **PhD**, – presented on its prospects at a national workshop near Washington, DC.

- <u>"Pursuit of a Valley fever vaccine passes significant milestone"</u> (Aug. 6): A human Valley fever vaccine candidate will proceed toward Phase 1 clinical trials thanks to a major investment from the National Institutes of Health, with a portion of the \$33 million going to the U of A through the Valley Fever Center for Excellence, led by Infectious Diseases professor John Galgiani, MD.
- "Anivive lands \$33M NIAID contract to advance human Valley fever vaccine" (Aug. 5): The pet pharmaceutical firm, which licensed research on a vaccine for dogs developed by a U of A Valley Fever Center for Excellence research team, including John Galgiani, MD, Marc Orbach, PhD, and Lisa Shubitz, DVM, in 2017 and has worked closely with the center, has enlisted partners to move forward on a human vaccine for the respiratory illness caused by fungal spores endemic to soils of the U.S. Southwest.
- "New study highlights scale and impact of long COVID" (Aug. 2): A new review published in The Lancet, with Immunobiology department head Janko Nikolich, MD, PhD, as co-author, highlights the global scale and impact of long COVID. It explains biological mechanisms behind the condition and suggests priority areas for future research. U of A Center on Aging codirector with GGP chief Mindy Fain, MD, Dr. Zugich also is a PI with PACCS division chief Sairam Parthasarathy, MD, on the NIH-funded AAPLS R25 training program, which now addresses pandemic prevention.
- "Program launches to engage faculty leaders, increase impact from innovative research" (July 29): Faculty Innovation Ambassadors, a new program of U of A commercialization arm, Tech Launch Arizona, creates envoys to serve as mentors and information resources for colleagues across campus. Pulmonary division's Julie Ledford, PhD, is in inaugural cohort and headlines a luncheon Sept. 30, Noon-1 p.m., in COM-T Social Hall.
