Honors & Awards



Dr. Tardiff awarded prestigious AHA lectureship: The Division of Cardiology's **Jil Tardiff, MD, PhD, FAHA**, was selected to present the Thomas W. Smith Memorial Lecture by the American Heart Association's Council on Basic Cardiovascular Sciences. She received the award at the organization's 2024 Scientific Sessions, Nov. 16-18, in Chicago, where she presented on cardiomyocytes, cardiomyopathies and cardiac remodeling. The Thomas W. Smith Memorial Lecture is one of a series of lectures from some of today's foremost clinicians and researchers as well as those with a lifetime of contributions to the field of cardiovascular disease. Dr. Tardiff also is the College of Medicine – Tucson's Steven M. Gootter Endowed Chair for the Prevention of Sudden Cardiac Death. **Learn more**.

- Valley Fever Center wins governor's innovation award: The U of A Valley Fever Center for Excellence with the Division of Infectious Diseases' John Galgiani, MD, as founding director and Fariba Donovan, MD, PhD, among its key researchers, received the Innovator of the Year Academia Award from the Arizona Technology Council in partnership with the Arizona Commerce Authority. The award was presented at the 21st Annual Governor's Celebration of Innovation Awards held Nov. 13 at a Phoenix gala. Learn more.
- Bringing precision to murky fish oil debate: Associate professor with the DOM's Division of Endocrinology, Dawn Coletta, PhD, is among several investigators led by Floyd "Ski" Chilton, PhD, professor of nutritional sciences, College of Agriculture, Life and Environmental Sciences, and BIO5

Institute member, who'll partner with researchers from Georgetown University and the MedStar Health Research Institute in Maryland to investigate how ancestry and genetics shape the body's response to omega-3 fatty acids. Their study, "Addressing Diet-Induced Health Disparities with Precision Nutrition and Omega-3 Fatty Acids," is supported by a \$3.9 million grant from the National Institutes of Health. Learn more.

- Congratulations to **Kevin F. Moynahan, MD**, vice dean of medical education and professor in the Division of General Internal Medicine, Geriatrics & Palliative Medicine, who was as elected chair of the Learning Communities Institute at its annual meeting this month. The institute is a national organization that Dr. Moynahan helped establish to support, study and expand the use of the learning community model for education (e.g., COM-T's Societies Program) within medical schools. He was the organization's second chair in 2015, and he is honored to again serve in this leadership role. Learn more.
- Fariba Donovan, MD, PhD, Infectious Diseases associate professor and Valley Fever Center researcher, won a 2024 Rosenfeld Foundation award for \$75,000 in September to advance her Valley fever research. She also was an invited speaker at the ID Week annual meeting (Los Angeles, Oct. 16-19), presenting on "Novel Antifungal Olorofim Use in Intractable CNS and Non-CNS Disseminated Coccidioidomycosis," along with three posters covering coccidioidomycosis vertebral osteomyelitis, U.S. healthcare costs related to Valley fever, and U.S. hospitalization incidence and cost of coccidioidal meningitis.
- Janet Funk, MD, DOM vice chair for research, professor in the Division of Endocrinology, Diabetes & Metabolism, and a member of the U of A Cancer Center's Cancer Biology Program, is one of three recipients of an RII Core Facilities Pilot Program grant, the U of A Office of Research, Innovation & Impact announced recently. The CFPP is a quarterly internal grant averaging \$10,000 in support of research projects that use RII's core facilities. Her funded project, "Targeting estrogen receptor signaling to halt ER+ breast cancer progression in bone," is part of a larger collaborative effort that also includes Sima Ehsani, MD, associate professor, Division of Hematology & Oncology, and Joshua Farr, PhD, associate professor, Division of Rheumatology. As the latest RII Core Facilities Pilot Program grant application submissions were due Nov. 6, check here for the next upcoming quarterly deadline in February (exact date posted soon).
- Franz Rischard, DO, director of the Pulmonary Hypertension Program in the Division of Pulmonary, Allergy, Critical Care & Sleep Medicine and interim associate dean for Clinical and Translational Research at the College of Medicine Tucson, was featured in an article that ran in the CHEST Daily News during the American College of Chest Physicians' CHEST 2024 event in Boston, Oct. 6-9, on a study, PVDOMICS, that he's an investigator on and which is also looking at refining our understanding of pulmonary hypertension as it impacts race, ethnicity and social determinants of health. "This article presents data from the pulmonary vascular phenomics project. It was an NIH-funded cohort where we participated in research for the seven largest clinical centers in the U.S. I lead the racial disparities portion and presented our data at the CHEST meetings in Boston," Dr. Rischard said. He hosted a similarly themed workshop Oct 22-23 for the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute, "Disparities Across the Spectrum of Pulmonary Vascular Disease" that the DOM News reported on and which included a Q&A with him on the subject. For both events, he said the data is unpublished and a manuscript is currently being written. Read the CHEST Daily News article here.
- Congratulations to the Division of Endocrinology's **Jennifer Stern, PhD**, recently awarded two grants from the National Institute on Aging, a unit of the National Institutes of Health. The first, for \$2.49 million over five years, is an R01 award for "Investigating the Role of Hepatic Glucagon

Receptor Signaling in Healthspan and Aging." It's focused on understanding mechanisms by which glucagon agonism could improve aging and decrease age-related disease, such as heart disease, obesity, and Type 2 diabetes. Dr. Stern explained, "While the role of insulin signaling in aging has been extensively studied, this work will be the first to examine the impact of enhancing glucagon signaling on aging." Glucagon, a hormone that opposes insulin action, is secreted by the pancreas and acts at the liver to maintain glucose homeostasis to help regulate blood sugar levels in response to fasting. Dr. Stern studies how glucagon signaling mediates the impact of caloric restriction on aging and metabolic function. The second award, an R21 award that supports early-stage research projects that could lead to breakthroughs in biomedical, behavioral, or clinical research, is a two-year study on "Serum markers of glucagon sensitivity in calorie restricted humans." Valued at \$425,958, Dr. Stern said of the R21, it "is our first human study aimed at translating our findings from mouse models of aging to human aging and the response to caloric restriction." Spotlight on U of A Arthritis Center



<u>Lupus Research Alliance Celebrates U of</u> <u>A's Dr. Kent Kwoh for Native American</u> <u>Heritage Month</u>

Arizona Arthritis Center Director C. Kent Kwoh, MD, MACR, who'll retire in December as Division of Rheumatology chief, has been recognized as a "Champion for Health Equity" in honor of Native American Heritage Month by the Lupus Research Alliance. A Nov. 14 article spotlights his and his clinical and research teams work to expand care and make research more accessible to the Tohono O'odham and Pascua Yaqui tribal peoples. That was strengthened in May when the Rheumatology clinic joined the **Lupus Clinical Investigators Network** (LuCIN) overseen by Lupus Therapeutics, the alliance's clinical affiliate. Learn more.

Sleep & dreams, Valley fever spreads, and better, more comfy breast cancer screening: Top honors for October-November in-the-media notices go to Rubin Naiman, PhD, assistant professor of medicine and member of the Andrew Weil Center for Integrative Medicine, now a part of the Department of Family & Community Medicine. A clinical psychologist specializing in integrative sleep and dream medicine, he coauthored a 2007 book, "Healthy Sleep," with the center's namesake founding director Andrew Weil, MD, a professor of medicine, and has also authored other books ("Healing Night: The Science & Spirit of Sleeping, Dreaming and Awakening," 2009; "The Yoga of Sleep," 2010; and "Hush: A Book of Bedtime Contemplations," 2014) on the topic. Dr. Naiman appeared

on <u>Doctor Radio</u>, a SiriusXM Radio channel hosted by NYU Langone, on Oct. 15, talking about the health implications and integrative medicine approaches to sleep and dreaming. Snippets of that interview were picked up by NPR stations around the country over the next 11 days, with 180+ media pickups.

Next up is perennial favorite, **John Galgiani, MD**, Division of Infectious Diseases professor and Valley Fever Center for Excellence director, with multiple mentions. First off, he and his team at the center (including fellow ID faculty member **Fariba Donovan, MD, PhD**) were lauded after being presented with the Innovator of the Year Award for Academia at a Phoenix gala Nov. 13 for the Arizona Governor's Celebration of Innovation Awards (Nov. 15: <u>Arizona Republic</u> | <u>PDF, InBusiness Greater Phoenix</u>; Nov. 14: <u>AZ Big Media</u> and <u>KVOI-Radio Tucson's Buckmaster Show</u>). The initial awards announcement came last month (Oct. 22: <u>Phoenix Business Journal</u>; <u>Arizona Technology Council</u>). Also in October, Dr. Galgiani also is quoted in reports on dueling Congress members' releases about introduction of a federal bill to fund a human vaccine for Valley fever (Oct. 22: <u>Visalia Times Delta</u>; Oct. 18: <u>KERO-TV Bakersfield, CA</u>). Likewise, there are several mentions of the growing risk of the fungal respiratory illness due to climate change (Oct. 17: <u>Nation's Health</u>; Oct. 13: <u>Vancouver Columbian</u>; Oct. 7: <u>Miami Herald</u>, <u>Fort Worth Star-Telegram</u>, and <u>Kansas City Star</u>; Oct. 2: <u>Los Angeles Times</u> – *this story had 30+ media pickups*).

A little ahead of her Oct. 31 retirement, **Hsiao-Hui "Sherry" Chow, PhD**, a Division of Hematology & Oncology professor and researcher, made the news as part of the research team that won a \$3.3 million National Cancer Institute grant to facilitate more accurate, comfortable breast cancer screening (Nov. 6: The ASCO Post; Oct. 28: Applied Radiation Online; Oct. 25: Applied Radiation Oncology; and Oct. 24: Radiology Business) spurred by an Oct. 21 U of A Health Sciences story. She and her career also were lauded in a U of A Cancer Center profile reposted as a DOM Featured Spotlight.

Division of Rheumatology chief and U of A Arthritis Center director **C. Kent Kwoh, MD**, who'll also retire later this fall, found his way into the news in the hoopla about the center's Oct. 10 annual Bear Down Celebration with Women's Basketball Coach Adia Barnes and U of A Athletic Director Desireé Reed-Francois. The popular event got great coverage before and after (Oct. 19: <u>Arizona Daily Star</u>; Oct. 11: <u>KGUN9-TV Tucson</u>, <u>KVOA-TV Tucson</u>; Oct. 10: <u>KVOA-TV Tucson</u>; and Sept. 30: <u>Arizona Daily Star</u>).

Hem-Onc division chief **Rachna Shroff, MD**, is cited a few times discussing treatment advances for those affected by liver cancer, the sixth most commonly diagnosed form of cancer, just in time for

Liver Cancer Awareness Month, i.e., October (Oct. 29: <u>Good News Planet</u>; Oct. 28: <u>WSBT-TV South</u> <u>Bend, IN</u>; Oct. 24: <u>WHNT-TV Huntsville, AL</u>, and <u>WMT-Radio Cedar Rapids, IA</u>).

Hem-Onc associate professor **Sima Ehsani Chimeh, MD**, won plaudits for her efforts to bring inclusion to breast cancer research to ensure diverse populations are represented in clinical trials (Oct. 6: Lovin' Life; Oct. 3: Tucson Weekly; and Oct. 2: Foothills News).

Lastly, honorable mentions to Division of Inpatient Medicine assistant professor Macklin Loveland, MD, whose research on TikTok medical misinformation keeps coming back (Nov. 5: Health Digital), after pulling in 200+ media pickups in May 2023 when it was presented at Digestive Disease Week; Lalitha Madhavan, MD, PhD, in the GGP division and Department of Neurology, for agreeing to give a presentation Nov. 17 on regenerative medicine and Parkinson's disease at SaddleBrooke, a retirement community north of Tucson (Oct. 25: Saddlebag Notes); and Dermatology division associate professor Daniel Butler, MD, for "A new blueprint for pruritis care," (Oct. 16: MedPage Today), on his JAMA review article about general itchiness and its causes.

- "New potential drug for Parkinson's-related cognitive decline, dementia found" (Nov. 19): Parkinson's disease causes difficulty in movement and balance, but its cognitive symptoms receive less attention and have no good treatments. Lalitha Madhavan, MD, PhD, a neurology associate professor with a dual appointment in the Division of General Internal Medicine, Geriatrics & Palliative Medicine, and Kelsey Bernard, PhD, a researcher in her lab, are among co-authors on a paper published in Experimental Neurology showing, in an animal model, the protein PNA5 appears to have a protective effect on brain cells. The discovery could help Parkinson's patients.
- <u>"Tucson Transplant Symposium spotlights chronic kidney disease"</u> (Nov. 4): The Division of Nephrology co-hosted the inaugural symposium with Department of Surgery, offering 3.0 CMEs for clinicians across southern Arizona interested in the latest information on kidney transplants, the most commonly transplanted organ. Nearly 40 clinicians attended. Among DOM faculty presenting were: Nephrology's Bekir Tanriover, MD, MPH, MBA chief of the division; Venkatesh Ariyamuthu, MD; Aneesha Shetty, MD, MPH; and Abd Assalam Qannus, MD; and the Division of Infectious Diseases' Saman Nematollahi, MD. - <u>"Chemoprevention innovator advances Cancer Center's impact on early-stage trials"</u> (Oct. 25): With more than a quarter century's worth of dedication to the University of Arizona Cancer Center and her retirement approaching, the value of **Hsiao-Hui "Sherry" Chow, PhD**'s impactfulness has been felt far beyond her work with early-phase cancer prevention research trials.

- <u>"Researchers using \$3.3M NCI grant to develop better breast cancer screening technology"</u> (Oct. 21): College of Medicine Tucson researchers, including the Division of Hematology & Oncology's Hsiao-Hui "Sherry" Chow, PhD, are leading a team that will test noncompression CT technology, which has the potential to detect more breast cancers more accurately while increasing comfort and decreasing radiation exposure.
- "College of Medicine Tucson's Hepato-Pancreato-Biliary CME Seminar draws 50 clinicians" (Oct. 9): About 50 general surgeons, oncologists, gastroenterologists, primary care physicians, and HPB specialists who care for these patients attended the daylong event. Among presenters, moderators and panelists were five DOM faculty: the Division of Hematology's Rachna Shroff, MD, MS, Aaron Scott, MD, and Junaid Arshad, MD, MS; and Division of Gastroenterology's Oleh Haluszka, MD, and Joshua Melson, MD.
